

MINUTES OF THE WORK SESSION
OF THE CADDO PARISH COMMISSION
HELD ON THE 3rd DAY OF MAY, 2021

The Caddo Parish Commission met in a Work Session, on the above date, at 3:30 p.m., in the Government Chambers, with Mr. Johnson, presiding, and the following members in attendance constituting a quorum: Commissioners Burrell, Cawthorne, Chavez, Hopkins, Johnson, Lazarus, Taliaferro, and Young (9). ABSENT: Commissioners Atkins, Epperson, and Gage-Watts (3).

The invocation was given by Mr. Cawthorne, and Mr. Taliaferro led the Commission in the Pledge of Allegiance.

AGENDA ADDITIONS

It was **moved by Mr. Chavez**, seconded by Mr. Lazarus, *to expand the agenda and add Authorize appointment of Chris Kracman to the Long Range Planning Citizen's Advisory Committee to study zoning and planning in the Parish under New Business.*

Mr. Chavez said that Mr. Kracman reached out to him and desired to be on the Citizen's Advisory Committee.

It was **moved by Mr. Chavez**, seconded by Mr. Lazarus, *to expand the agenda and add Special Recognition to Sam Burns under New Business.*

Mr. Chavez said that Caddo/Shreveport deserves accolades for being the Valspar Champion during his first PGA Tour.

At this time, sitting chair, Mr. Chavez opened the floor to allow anyone to speak for or against the agenda additions. There being no one to speak in favor or against it, the sitting chair closed the public hearing.

At this time, Mr. Chavez's motion carried, as shown by the following roll call votes: AYES: Commissioners Burrell, Cawthorne, Chavez, Hopkins, Lazarus, Taliaferro, and Young (8). NAYS: None (0). ABSENT: Commissioners Atkins, Epperson, Gage-Watts and Johnson (4). ABSTAIN: None (0).

At this time, Mr. Chavez's motion carried, as shown by the following roll call votes: AYES: Commissioners Burrell, Cawthorne, Chavez, Hopkins, Lazarus, Taliaferro, and Young (8). NAYS: None (0). ABSENT: Commissioners Atkins, Epperson, Gage-Watts and Johnson (4). ABSTAIN: None (0).

NEW BUSINESS

It was **moved by Mr. Johnson**, seconded by Mr. Lazarus, *that Ordinance 6064 of 2021, in regards to Zoning Case 21-5-P, an ordinance to amend Volume II of the Code of Ordinances of the Parish of Caddo, as amended, the Caddo Parish Unified Development Code, by amending the zoning of property located on the north side of North Market Street approximately two hundred and sixty feet east of Roy Road Extension, Caddo Parish, LA, from C-1, Neighborhood Commercial District to C-2, Corridor Commercial District, and to otherwise provide with respect thereto* be moved to Thursday's agenda for introduction. Motion carried, as shown by the following roll call votes: AYES: Commissioners Burrell, Cawthorne, Chavez, Hopkins, Johnson, Lazarus, Taliaferro, and Young (9). NAYS: None (0). ABSENT: Commissioners Atkins, Epperson, and Gage-Watts (3). ABSTAIN: None (0).

It was **moved by Mr. Jackson**, seconded by Mr. Hopkins, *that Ordinance No. 6065 of 2021, an ordinance amending the Budget of Estimated Revenues & Expenditures for the General Fund for the year 2021 to provide an appropriation for a one-time pay adjustment to parish employees who performed essential work during the COVID-19 Pandemic and to otherwise provide with respect thereto* be moved to Thursday's agenda for introduction.

Mr. Jackson said that this is to show appreciation for all of the essential workers that have performed essential tasks during the pandemic. He also requested that the Clerk of the Commission attach a copy of the letters from the City of Shreveport, Caddo Sheriff's Office, and the Caddo School Board to their employees on the Regular Session agenda.

Substitute motion by Mr. Johnson, seconded by Mr. Taliaferro, *to delay Ordinance No. 6065 of 2021.*

Mr. Johnson agreed with Mr. Jackson, but he would like to draft a comprehensive plan to expend the funds for the American Rescue Act funds. He does understand that this is reimbursable, but feels that these funds be delayed until the Parish receives the funds.

Mr. Burrell wanted to know if this will go to another committee. Mr. Johnson said that he would like this to go to the American Rescue Plan Committee, where they will discuss rolling out a comprehensive plan on expending the funds.

Mr. Taliaferro wanted to know if anyone was furloughed or laid off during the Pandemic. Dr. Wilson said that there were no furloughs, but some employees could not do their duties from home, so those employees had to take sick/vacation time. If they didn't have time accrued, they went in the hole. Mr. Taliaferro wanted to know if the personnel who worked overtime were compensated. Dr. Wilson said that they were.

Mr. Cawthorne clarified that this will be added to the recommendations made by the American Rescue Plan Committee. Mr. Johnson agreed and said that this will be a part of the comprehensive plan formulated in that Committee.

Mr. Hopkins wanted to know if essential workers and all employees would need to be reflected differently in the title, since the two terms are different. Mrs. Bryant explained that essential workers in Mr. Hopkins' views is in regards to inclement weather.

Mr. Chavez requested a report that shows all the employees who were able to work from home, those who were not able to work from home and were forced to take PTO, and those who were not able to work from home and were not able to use PTO.

Mr. Jackson wanted to know the concerns regarding the title of the ordinance. Mr. Hopkins explained that there is a difference between essential and non-essential employees. Mrs. Bryant said that there have been times that there was a distinction between essential and non-essential personnel, i.e. inclement weather, but in this case, all functions of the Parish still had to operate, so all employees were considered essential.

Mr. Jackson said that the Pandemic & Natural Disaster Committee has vetted this ordinance, so he does not understand why it needs to go to another committee to be vetted.

Mr. Jackson also wanted to know if a committee was established to give recommendations on those dollars. He also explained that everyone had an opportunity to attend his ad-hoc committee, and the President of the Commission sits on the ad-hoc Committee. Mr. Jackson said there was ample opportunity for anyone to express their concerns. He reiterated that this went through the Pandemic Committee, and this is pandemic pay. Mr. Jackson also mentioned that the Parish should have the funds from American Rescue Plan by the time of adoption. Finance decided that it would be best to take these monies out of the General Fund. Mrs. Bryant also explained that these expenses could be reimbursed when the American Rescue Plan funds are received.

Mr. Jackson also pointed out that there will be recommendations from the Pandemic Committee on how the American Rescue Plan funds are expended, but if the American Rescue Plan Committee is going to have exclusive authority over those monies, then the body should adopt an ordinance. Mr. Jackson wanted to know if there was currently an ordinance such as that in place. Attorney Frazier said that there was not, but the ad-hoc committees were appointed by the President. Mr. Jackson said that there is no exclusivity on the pandemic dollars that the Parish is receiving. He asked that this ordinance be moved forward for introduction.

Mr. Burrell wanted to know if the Commission is waiting on the American Rescue Plan Committee's recommendation prior to moving this ordinance forward or if another ordinance will be introduced in place of the current one being presented. Mr. Johnson explained that all committees make recommendations to the full body; one committee is no more powerful than the next. He further explained that his motion is to roll out a comprehensive plan regarding all of the American Rescue Plan funds. Mr. Johnson also pointed out that the guidelines for the funds have not been officially published just yet. He also mentioned that these funds will go into the American Rescue Fund, not the General Fund. Mr. Johnson said that this ordinance would then die and another ordinance would be introduced.

Mr. Chavez would like to get the requested report prior to Thursday. He also does not feel that the employees who were paid during the pandemic should receive \$1,500. He is concerned with those who had to use PTO to stay employed.

Mr. Taliaferro wanted to know the metrics for selecting the \$1,500 for full-time employees and \$900 for part-time employees. Mr. Jackson explained that they looked at other agencies to see what their levels were.

Mr. Jackson pointed out that the guidelines have not been set by the U.S. Treasury, however, in the legislation it states that the pay adjustment shall be reimbursed from funds received from the American Rescue Plan under the essential worker provisions in accordance to the Subtitle M, Section 9901 of the American Rescue Plan.

Mr. Jackson said that the parish employees have worked hard throughout the entire pandemic. He reiterated that committees have the jurisdiction to recommend to the full body to expend funds. He asked that the Commission move this ordinance forward for introduction. He also pointed out that this is consistent with what other agencies have done with their federal dollars.

Mr. Burrell wanted to know if these two motions are competing recommendations. Mr.

Jackson said that it is not his hope that the Pandemic Committee would be competing with any other committees. We should be working together, he said. Mr. Jackson also explained that if it is the goal of the American Rescue Plan Committee to set the Pandemic Committee to the side, then that is what needs to be done.

Mr. Johnson agreed that the committees are not in competition with each other. He just feels that a comprehensive plan should be drafted to spend the American Rescue Plan dollars.

Amendment by Mr. Cawthorne, seconded by Mr. Jackson, *to move Ordinance No. 6065 of 2021 to Thursday's agenda for introduction, but not expend the pay adjustments until the American Rescue Plan funds have been received by the federal government.*

Mr. Johnson said that the title cannot be changed.

Attorney Frazier wanted to know which motion is the amendment to. Mr. Johnson said that it is an amendment to Mr. Jackson's original motion. Attorney Frazier further explained that if the title is changed on the original motion, then the ordinance cannot be moved to Thursday for introduction.

Mrs. Bryant clarified that Mr. Cawthorne's amendment is to not make any payments until the monies are in the bank. He did not change the source of the funding. She pointed out that the payments would not be issued until July.

At this time, Mr. Cawthorne's motion carried, as shown by the following roll call votes: AYES: Commissioners Burrell, Cawthorne, Chavez, Hopkins, Johnson, Taliaferro, and Young (8). NAYS: Commissioner Lazarus (1). ABSENT: Commissioners Atkins, Epperson, and Gage-Watts (3). ABSTAIN: None (0).

It was **moved by Mr. Jackson**, seconded by Mr. Johnson, *that Ordinance No. 6066 of 2021, an ordinance amending the Budget of Estimated Revenues & Expenditures for the Economic Development Fund and the Oil & Gas Fund for Juneteenth firework display and to otherwise provide with respect thereto* be moved to Thursday's agenda for introduction.

Mr. Jackson said that this is similar to the KTBS Freedom Fest. He also pointed out that Juneteenth was recognized in perpetuity last years as an official parish holiday.

Mr. Burrell suggested that the allowance for fireworks be extended from Juneteenth until Independence Day. Mr. Johnson wants to ensure that there are not issues with the City having an ordinance in place that fireworks are prohibited at certain times of the year.

Mr. Cawthorne wanted to know the dates of the festival. Mr. Johnson said that it is June 19-21.

Mr. Taliaferro wanted to know if other sponsors could participate to help offset the cost of the fireworks. Mr. Jackson said that KSLA might want exclusivity with this festival. He also pointed out that this normally goes through Administration.

Mr. Hopkins asked that Legal review the candidates for the Citizens Advisory Committee to ensure they are in the unincorporated areas of the Parish.

At this time, Mr. Jackson's motion carried, as shown by the following roll call votes: AYES: Commissioners Burrell, Cawthorne, Chavez, Hopkins, Johnson, Lazarus, Taliaferro, and Young (9). NAYS: None (0). ABSENT: Commissioners Atkins, Epperson, and Gage-Watts (3). ABSTAIN: None (0).

It was **moved by Mr. Lazarus**, seconded by Mr. Cawthorne, *to authorize the Commission to make project selection to forward to the State for possible funding relative to LCDBG Program to Thursday's agenda.*

Mr. Lazarus said that this is a water well project for Waterworks District No. 7. They've lost an old well due to iron content and it needs to be replaced.

Mr. Young said that there is a statewide policy to try and get people off of wells. He said that this project is to build a new one. Mr. Johnson explained that the water source for the south side of the Parish is the Red River. A water purification plant would need to be constructed to process the water.

At this time, Mr. Lazarus' motion carried, as shown by the following roll call votes: AYES: Commissioners Burrell, Cawthorne, Chavez, Hopkins, Johnson, Lazarus, Taliaferro, and Young (9). NAYS: None (0). ABSENT: Commissioners Atkins, Epperson, and Gage-Watts (3). ABSTAIN: None (0).

It was **moved by Mr. Jackson**, seconded by Mr. Chavez, *to authorize Caddo Homeland Security update on FEMA request relative to the Winter Storm (FEMA-4590-DR) and FEMA request relative to Hurricane Laura (FEMA-DR-4559-LA) be moved to Thursday's agenda.*

Mr. Jackson asked that Administration ensure that a representative from Homeland Security be available for the Regular Session. He also said that Ms. Chase, FEMA, suggested that the Commission work with the small rural towns to ensure that no FEMA dollars were being left on the table.

Mr. Burrell wanted to know if the winter storm and Hurricane Laura covers residents as well. Dr. Wilson said that there is a residential portal.

At this time, Mr. Jackson's motion carried, as shown by the following roll call votes: AYES: Commissioners Burrell, Cawthorne, Hopkins, Johnson, Lazarus, Taliaferro, and Young (8). NAYS: None (0). ABSENT: Commissioners Atkins, Chavez, Epperson, and Gage-Watts (4). ABSTAIN: None (0).

It was **moved by Mr. Young**, seconded by Mr. Lazarus, *that the appointment of Chris Kracman to the Long Range Planning Citizen's Advisory Committee to study planning and zoning in the Parish be moved to Thursday's agenda.*

Substitute motion by Mr. Jackson, seconded by Mr. Chavez, *to englobe and move the following items to Thursday's Regular Session:*

ADMINISTRATOR REPORT

- Confederate Monument Update

Dr. Wilson said that only one bid which came in at four times what is budgeted for the project. They will resume the process and continue to look for a service provider that will relocate the monument within budget.

- Disparity Study Update

Administration has received the proposals from the disparity study and selected Keen Independent Research.

- I-49 Welcome Sign Update

LADOTD approved the design and are now in the finalizing process for that.

- U.S. Treasury Emergency Rental Assistance Program

3,700 applications have been submitted, and the first check was issued April 30 to the recipients of the first round. They are still encouraging people to apply for it.

Mr. Jackson wanted to know if the weekly lottery has been updated. Mrs. Bryant said that they are currently doing 400 per week.

Mr. Burrell said that it seems that the community organizations who are working on the ERAP are not communicating with each. It is creating some confusion with the constituents, he said. Mrs. Barnett explained that all five community partners enters the information into the same program, but some of the organizations are reaching out to the individuals themselves to gather the information.

- E. Edward Jones Housing Trust Fund RFP

The RFP is scheduled to be advertised Thursday, April 22 with a return date of June 30.

- Summer Intern Program

Dr. Wilson said that it will go online this Friday.

- Pin Ceremony

Dr. Wilson also announced that the Pin Ceremony will be held on Friday, May 7 at 2:00 p.m. The program will be done virtually.

COMMUNIQUES/COMMITTEE REPORTS

- Mr. Burrell asked about the Gun Buyback Program. Mrs. Bryant said that they met with the District Attorney's Office and are scheduling a meeting with the Sheriff. More information will be forthcoming, she said.

- Mr. Jackson thanked Administration for providing the Commissioners with the Lobbyist report. He also mentioned that the Parish received \$100,000 as part of the Supplemental Appropriations Bill.

Mr. Jackson also complimented the setup of the agenda. Mr. Johnson said that the order of the agenda is listed in the By-Laws.

He also asked Administration for an update on House Bill 105 in regards to the Port. He asked that Legal provide a brief summary on the bill. Attorney Bernstein explained that a bill was passed last year, and there was a question about whether it was properly adopted. The Constitution addresses deep water ports, but this is not a deep water port. There was also a question a few years ago if a new building at the Port had to meet MPC zoning and landscaping standards.

Mr. Jackson wanted to know if the Port would have to comply with any local zoning if this bill were to pass. Attorney Bernstein said that there is a provision in the bill that would take out the authority of local governments to have any regulatory power over the Port.

Mr. Jackson wanted to know if the Parish would have to get zoning for a new building under the Constitution. Attorney Bernstein said that the Parish would have to "cross our t's and dot our l's" with zoning in the City. Mr. Jackson asked that Administration and Legal look into the bill.

The President advised Mr. Jackson that his time has expired. Mr. Jackson asked for an additional minute. It was **moved by Mr. Chavez**, seconded by Mr. Burrell, *to extend his time by one minute.* Motion carried by acclamation.

Mr. Jackson continued and said that he would like some guidance from Administration to provide some level of protection. He wanted to make it clear that he is not against the bill, but would like continued discussion on this bill.

- Mr. Cawthorne announced that the Economic Development Committee has been rescheduled for Wednesday, May 5 at 1:30 p.m.

- Mr. Burrell announced that the Spring State Fair is going on at the LA State Fairgrounds. He encouraged all to attend.

- Attorney Frazier said that HB 105 was received by the Senate and read for the first time today. It has been placed on the calendar for the second reading. She said that if there is going to be some action, it needs to take place relatively quickly.

Mr. Jackson suggested that we utilize the Parish representative to reach out to Mr. England to see what compromise could be had.

- Mr. Chavez announced that the Long Range Planning Committee will meet on Thursday, May 6 at 11:00 a.m.

CITIZENS COMMENTS (late arrivals)

Mrs. Lynn Stevens came before the Commission and gave the following comment:

I'm the director of Workforce Development, prior to that I was with United Way for 10 years. I got a lot of working knowledge about what goes on in our community. Right now, goodwill was really one of the only agencies that really stayed open through the entire pandemic. While the Workforce Commission offices and coordinating Development Corporation was closed to the public, we stayed open, because we realized very early during the pandemic, that individuals needed help. They just needed to help file for unemployment. They didn't know why they couldn't get through to the unemployment line and why it took, you know, two hours to get the phone call if they even got through. And so we were there during that whole entire time. Through last year, we ran eighty job fairs, in person. At Goodwill Industries, we're averaging two a week. There's one tomorrow, one Thursday, this week, good jobs, all kinds of jobs, people are calling us, because they just desperately need people right now. I rolled in just as you were talking about the benefits. It's about \$13 an hour you need to make to be over that threshold in our state. People are getting benefits that probably shouldn't get benefits in regards to you know, their filing and you know, the state they're so inundated. I don't want to say they're filing bad claims, but they're filing bad claims. Goodwill is there for you all to use. We are helping as many people as we can every day find employment in our community. And yes, there are tons of jobs out there they exist right now. Our unemployment rate right now is higher than the state higher than the national average right here in Caddo parish. So we desperately need to get people out working, and really work towards the skills because the jobs market is also changing at the same time. You know, it's a lot more digital skills you're going to need in the future. A lot more things that you're going to need. We're trying to teach those tools at the same time. So as far as kids and youth, we do that as well. We help run the city's summer job employment program. And so we do that as well. We do it a little bit different because we also teach workforce development skills. So I call it life skills, because it's things that you learned and I learned this from my parents and your parents about not only gaining a job but maintaining job and I think that's a critical component. We also follow individuals for 90 days after they've been employed, a lot of companies just kind of put them in a job and don't realize what happens, our success rate just even during COVID time last year was 85%. Stayed in the job 90 days or longer. So whatever we can do a goodwill, we're here, we're willing, we have the capacity, we're stretched really thin, because I say we're willing to go on every day. But we will try to make it work and help the community because that's what we're there to do. LifeLock is a program for youth 18 to 24. They have some kind of criminal involvement doesn't have to be major. It can be marijuana, it can be all kinds of things. And it's a fabulous program, it's department of life or grant that we were able to obtain were one in five in the country. And it gives me dollars to not only help them find employment, but really give them the skills, so I can pay for them to go get forklift training. And then I can place them right into a forklift job making \$15 or \$16 per hour. We did a module x job fair last Thursday. We placed almost 20 people making \$16.50 an hour. It's a great program, we've got about another year, I have about 100 youth that we were able to work on to be able to touch and maintain. And these are the people that we know, unfortunately, are probably out running our streets and getting in trouble and shouldn't be.

It was **moved by Mr. Cawthorne**, seconded by Mr. Chavez, *to suspend the rules to allow for dialogue between Ms. Stevens and the Commissioners. Motion carried by acclamation.*

Mr. Burrell wanted to know if Goodwill jobs are minimum wage jobs. Ms. Stevens said that their model has changed over the years. They serve the hardest of the hard. They work with several companies such as the service industry, Ronpak, etc.

Mr. Chavez encouraged everyone to tour the Goodwill Center with Ms. Stevens. He also commended Ms. Stevens and her staff on teaching people how to fill out a resume and how to get a job in today's society. Mr. Chavez wanted to know if they could set up a program at the Juvenile Detention Center for those juveniles who are 18-24. Dr. Wilson said that the age for juveniles cut off at 17 years. Mr. Jackson suggested that they meet with Director Clay Walker with Juvenile Services. Ms. Stevens said that they already have a program with Juvenile Services.

- *Ordinance No. 6062 of 2021, an ordinance amending the 2021 Budget to adopt the Budget of Estimated Revenues & Expenditures for the Section 8 Fund and to otherwise provide with respect thereto*
- *Ordinance No. 6063 of 2021, an ordinance amending the Budget of Estimated Revenues & Expenditures for the General Fund to provide an appropriation for a Safe Summer Work Placement Program and to otherwise provide with respect thereto*

At this time, there was no further discussion to come before the Commission, so the Commission adjourned at 5:28 p.m.
